The months of October to December 2025 were marked by purposeful activity, strategic consolidation, and focused preparation. Members of the PAN Executive Council, including myself, conducted two inspection visits to Abeokuta to ensure readiness for the conference by the Local Organising Committee, ably led by Dr. Femi Akodu.

Throughout the quarter, the Executive Council remained fully engaged through regular and emergency meetings, keeping PAN responsive to emerging priorities in child health and organizational governance. Our scientific and advocacy efforts gained momentum, with PAN participating in key national and international stakeholder engagements, including NAFDAC initiatives on medicines regulation, meetings focused on

immunization and newborn care.

Notable progress was recorded under the IPA/PAN Immunization Champions Project, particularly in Measles–Rubella and HPV vaccine sensitization and delivery nationwide. A major highlight was the PAN/IPA Stakeholders Consultative Meeting on HPV Routinisation Strategies and Experience Sharing Workshop held on 8 December 2025 in Abuja. The meeting brought together stakeholders from relevant Federal Ministries, National and FCT Primary Health Care Development Agencies, National Orientation Agency, Development partners (Gates Foundation, Pathfinder International, Medicaid Cancer Foundation, WAVA) and PAN/IPA Immunization Champions from all 36 states and the FCT, PAN EXCO and BoT members. In advancing environmental and global child health advocacy, PAN was represented by Dr. Chika Duru, our Air Quality Advocacy Associate, at the Pan-African Conference on Environment, Climate Change and Health held in Nairobi, Kenya (21–24 October 2025) as part of our Air quality project with Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health (RCPCH) UK. We also strengthened international collaboration through the signing of an MOU with the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) on iKMC training, reinforcing PAN's growing global footprint alongside partnerships with IPA and RCPCH UK.

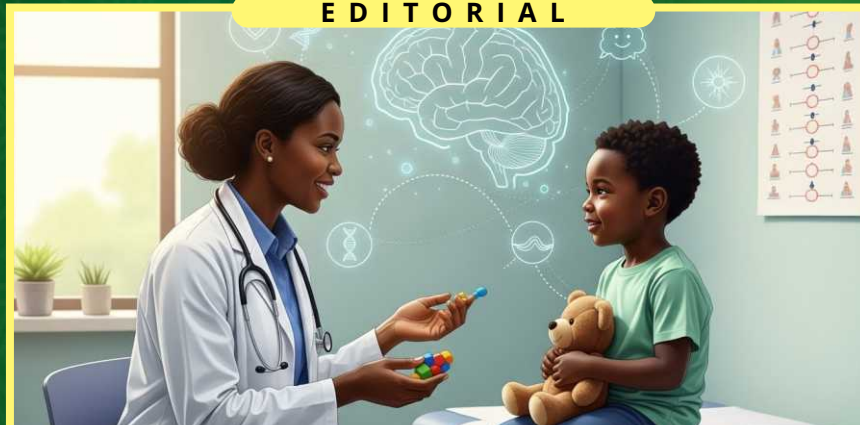

Mental Health Disorders in Children: An ICD-11–Aligned Clinical Overview

Integrated Narrative Review

Mental health disorders in children and adolescents represent a major public health concern, contributing substantially to morbidity, functional impairment, and long-term psychosocial outcomes. Childhood-onset mental disorders frequently persist into adulthood, affecting educational attainment, interpersonal relationships, and occupational functioning. Early identification and evidence-based intervention are therefore critical. The **ICD-11** provides a developmentally sensitive framework for classification, acknowledging age-related variations in symptom expression and course.

Conceptual Framework

Mental health disorders in children arise from **dynamic interactions between neurodevelopmental vulnerability, genetic predisposition, and environmental exposures**, expressed through age-dependent symptom patterns. ICD-11 emphasizes **developmental context, functional impairment, and clinical judgment** rather than rigid symptom counts, making it particularly suitable for paediatric populations. Across diagnostic groupings, several **cross-**

cutting principles

 apply:

- High rates of comorbidity (e.g., anxiety with neurodevelopmental disorders; depression with disruptive behaviour).
- Symptom expression varies with **cognitive, emotional, and social maturity**.
- Family, school, and community contexts are integral to assessment and management.
- Early intervention improves **long-term developmental trajectories**.

Epidemiologic Patterns Across ICD-11 Groupings

- **Most prevalent**: neurodevelopmental disorders, anxiety disorders, disruptive behaviour disorders, and stress-related disorders.
- **Adolescence** marks increased incidence of mood disorders, substance-related disorders, eating disorders, and self-harm.
- **Rare but high-impact**: psychotic

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- disorders, catatonia, severe eating disorders, factitious disorders, and some neurocognitive disorders.
- Social adversity, trauma exposure, chronic illness, and neurodevelopmental conditions substantially increase risk across categories.

Shared Pathophysiologic Themes

While each diagnostic grouping has distinct mechanisms, common pathways include:

- **Neurodevelopmental alterations** affecting executive control, emotion regulation, and social cognition.
- **Neurotransmitter and circuit dysregulation** (fronto-limbic, cortico-striatal, reward systems).
- **Stress system dysregulation**, particularly involving the HPA axis.
- **Psychological learning mechanisms**, including maladaptive threat conditioning, avoidance, and reinforcement.
- **Environmental moderators**, including attachment patterns, parenting practices, peer relationships, and sociocultural factors.

Clinical Presentation: Developmental Perspective

Children often present with **non-specific or masked symptoms**:

- Emotional distress may appear as somatic complaints, irritability, or behavioural dysregulation.
- Internalising disorders are frequently under-detected, especially in boys and younger children.

- Externalising symptoms may dominate presentations even when anxiety, trauma, or depression are primary drivers.

Diagnosis Using ICD-11

Diagnosis relies on:

1. **Clinical description and developmental history**
2. **Functional impairment across settings**
3. **Persistence beyond expected developmental norms**
4. **Exclusion of medical, neurologic, or substance-induced causes**

Collateral information from caregivers and schools is essential. ICD-11 encourages **dimensional severity and trait-based descriptors**, particularly for personality pathology and behavioural disorders.

Investigations: A Targeted Approach

- Most childhood mental health disorders are diagnosed **clinically**.
- Investigations are used to:
 - Exclude medical mimics (e.g., thyroid disease, epilepsy).
 - Identify complications (e.g., malnutrition, metabolic effects of medication).
 - Guide safe pharmacologic treatment.
- Over-investigation may reinforce somatic preoccupation and should be avoided once serious pathology is excluded.

Management Principles

Effective care is **multimodal, staged, and collaborative**:

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- **Psychological and behavioural interventions** form the foundation for most disorders.
- **Pharmacotherapy** is adjunctive, reserved for moderate–severe illness or specific indications.
- **Family and school involvement** are central to sustained improvement.
- Long-term follow-up is needed for relapse prevention, developmental transitions, and treatment adherence.

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Table 2. Diagnostic Workflow for Suspected Childhood Mental Health Disorders

1. Presenting concern

- Emotional, behavioural, cognitive, or somatic symptoms

2. Developmental context

- Age appropriateness, milestones, school functioning

3. Multi-informant history

- Child, caregivers, teachers, records

4. Functional impact

- Home, school, peers

5. Risk assessment

- Self-harm, suicidality, aggression, safeguarding

6. Rule out medical/substance causes

- Targeted examination and tests

7. ICD-11 diagnostic formulation

- Primary diagnosis + comorbidities + severity

Step 3: Reassessment of response (6–12 weeks)

→ Functional improvement? Symptom reduction?

Step 4: Pharmacotherapy (if indicated)

→ Moderate–severe illness, high risk, or non-response

→ Start low, monitor closely, involve specialists

Step 5: Ongoing monitoring and relapse prevention

→ Developmental transitions, adherence, comorbidity management

Algorithm 2. Indications for Urgent or Specialist Referral

- Active suicidal ideation or self-harm
- Psychosis, catatonia, or severe mood instability
- Medical compromise (e.g., eating disorders)
- Rapid developmental regression
- Suspected abuse, neglect, or factitious disorder
- Treatment resistance or diagnostic uncertainty

Algorithm 1. General Management Pathway

Step 1: Engagement and psychoeducation

→ Normalize symptoms, explain diagnosis, set expectations

Step 2: First-line psychosocial interventions

→ CBT, behavioural therapy, parent training, trauma-focused therapy, school accommodations

Conclusion

ICD-11 provides a developmentally informed, clinically flexible framework for diagnosing and managing mental health disorders in children. Despite diagnostic diversity, common principles—early recognition, functional assessment, psychosocial first-line care, and family-centred intervention—underpin effective practice. Integrating mental health care into paediatric and primary care settings remains essential to reducing long-term

ACTIVITIES CARRIED OUT BY **PAN/IPA** IMMUNIZATION CHAMPIONS



Over the last quarter of 2025, our PAN/IPA Immunization champions in collaboration with the PAN Immunization committee and the PAN School Health programme committee carried out HPV sensitization outreaches in 13 schools across the six geo-political zones in Nigeria.

Over 3000 students nationwide were reached with information about HPV, Cervical cancer and the HPV vaccine. Other activities done included BMI assessment of the students, training of peer educators and establishment of HPV Health clubs to ensure continuous peer-to peer sensitization about HPV among the students.

During the outreach, over 200 girls were vaccinated across the country with the HPV vaccine.

Bayelsa State PAN/IPA Immunization Champions conducted a school outreach and sensitization exercise. A key highlight of the session was the low uptake of the HPV vaccine among eligible students. Out of 197 students present, only 18 girls had received the HPV vaccine, while 50 eligible girls had not been vaccinated. In collaboration with the school authorities, plans were made to obtain parental consent to enable vaccination during a follow-up visit.

COMMUNIQUE ISSUED AT THE END OF THE STAKEHOLDERS' CONSULTATIVE MEETING ON HPV VACCINE ROUTINIZATION STRATEGIES AND EXPERIENCE-SHARING WORKSHOP

Held on 8th December 2025, Abuja, Nigeria



A. Preambles

The International Pediatric Association (IPA) in collaboration with the Paediatrics Association of Nigeria (PAN) held a stakeholders Consultative forum and Experience Sharing Workshop on the 8th December, 2025, in West African College of Physician (WACOP) Conference Centre Abuja, Nigeria.

The workshop brought together the President and Executive Director of International Paediatric Association Dr Joseph Haddad, Dr Naveen Thacker, The President of Paediatric Association of Nigeria, Dr Ekanem Ekure, Past Presidents of Paediatric Association of Nigeria, Dr Alhassan Yakubu, Dr Dorothy Esangbedo, Her Excellency Zinnab Bagudu President Elect of the Union for International Cancer Control, President of Nigeria Society for Neonatal Medicine, Policymakers such as the Federal Ministry of Health, National Primary HealthCare Development Agency, National Orientation Agency, Women Advocate for Vaccine Access, Federal Ministry of Women Affairs, Pathfinder, Ministry of Budget and Planning and

Immunization Champions, Paediatricians, Public Health Experts, to share experiences, identify gaps, and chart a way forward for improving childhood immunizations in Nigeria specially with respect to Human Papilloma Virus Vaccine and Measles Rubella Vaccines recently rolled out.

The meeting featured welcome address, goodwill messages, keynote presentations, group sessions, and technical reviews covering key thematic areas on Overview of Human Papilloma Vaccine Infection and Cervical Cancer, Navigating the advocacy terrain, maximizing opportunities to Sustainable Demand Creation.

B. Observations

Participants noted the following:

1. Acknowledged the strengthened the PAN, NPHCDA collaboration, and efforts at improving Vaccination in Nigeria while noting the role of other partners.
2. The problems of sustaining vaccine acceptance and demands.

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3. About 8,000 women documented to die from Cervical Cancer.
4. Reasons for low demand and uptake of the Human Papilloma Virus
5. Myths and Misconception about HPV Vaccination
6. Channels for Spread of misinformation and Myths about HPV Vaccination.
7. Need for more funding
8. Attitude of healthcare workers to vaccination
9. Low vaccine coverage in internally displaced camps

C. Resolutions / Recommendations

After extensive deliberations, the workshop resolved as follows:

1. The need to strengthen policies to improve community partnership and grass root mobilization.
2. Integration of other HPV vaccination to the school; health programme.
3. Strengthen policy implementation frameworks to improve accountability and sustainability.
4. Expand access to quality primary

healthcare services, especially in underserved communities.

5. Promote locally driven research to address vaccine hesitancy
6. Intensify health education programs to improve parental knowledge and healthy practices.
7. Engage community leaders, faith-based organizations, and youth groups in generating demand for child health services.
8. Enhance IPA-PAN collaboration in research, capacity building, and advocacy.

D. Conclusion

Participants renewed their commitment to advancing child and adolescent health in Nigeria and globally. The workshop reaffirmed the vital roles of IPA, PAN, government agencies, and stakeholders in ensuring a healthier future for children.

remains committed to advancing neonatal health and promoting strategies that give every preterm baby the best chance at a healthy, fulfilling life.



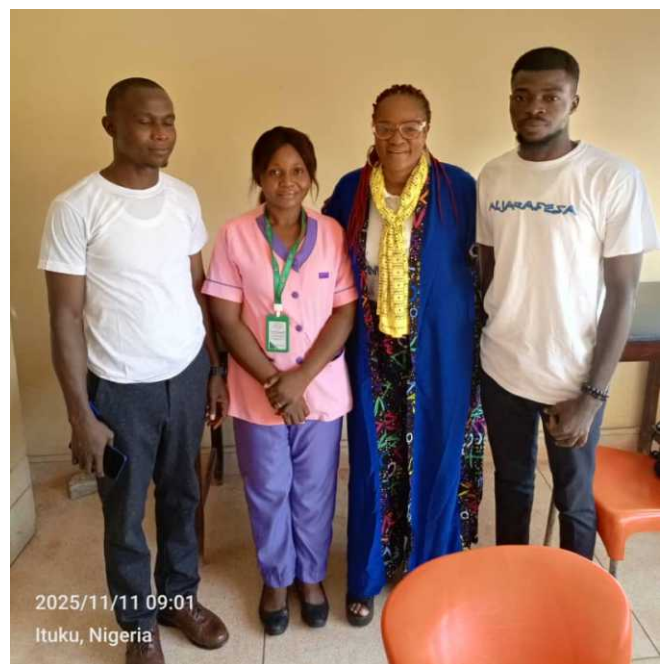

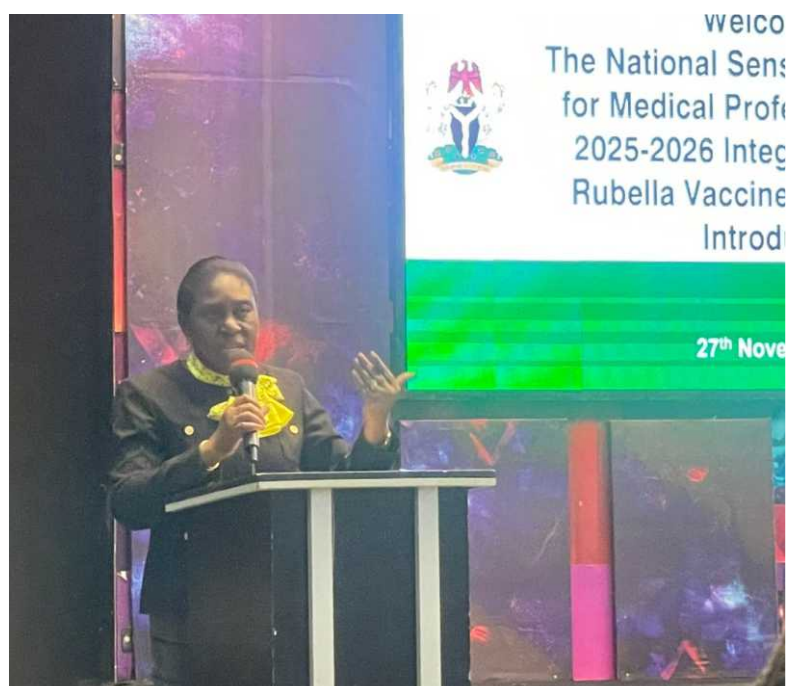


PAN Participates in NPHCDA Meeting on Measles–Rubella Rollout in Southern Nigeria



In Abuja, the President of the Paediatric Association of Nigeria (PAN), Dr Ekanem Ekure, joined State Immunization Champion teams and other medical professionals at the National Sensitization Meeting on the 2025–2026 Integrated Measles–Rubella Vaccine Campaign, organized by the National Primary Health Care Development Agency (NPHCDA). Dr Ekure delivered a goodwill message, reiterating the critical role of paediatricians across the country in driving advocacy, community engagement, and improved vaccine uptake during immunization campaigns. Foundation country directors and Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance Representatives who expressed their delight at the initiative, and pledged support for the campaign. Chairing the occasion was the first lady of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, Senator Oluremi Tinubu.

In his remarks, Prof. Muhammad Ali Pate, the Honourable Minister of Health and Social welfare spoke about the goals of the Nigerian Measles and Rubella Elimination Strategic Plan (NMRESP) 2019-2030 which aims at eliminating measles by 2030 through strengthening routine immunization, enhancing surveillance and outbreak response, integration of measles and rubella initiatives into primary health care, and promotion of innovative technologies. The measles-rubella campaign would additionally reduce the incidence of congenital rubella syndrome.

Paediatric Association of Nigeria (PAN) was invited by the National Primary Health Care Development Agency (NPHCDA) on behalf of the Federal Ministry of Health and Social Welfare (FMoH&SF) to attend the National flag-off of the Measles -Rubella (MR) Vaccine introduction, and integrated campaign against polio, human papilloma virus (HPV), routine immunization (RI) and neglected tropical diseases (NGT). This held on 6th October, 2025 at the Banquet Hall of the Presidential Villa in Abuja, Federal Capital Territory (FCT).

The opening remarks was delivered by the Executive

Director of the NPHCDA, Dr. Muyi Aina. In attendance were Traditional and religious leaders. These include His Imperial Majesty, Oba Adeyeye Ogunwusi Enitan, Ojaja II, the Ooni of Ife, and His eminence Alhaji Muhammadu Sa'ad Abubakar III, and His eminence, the Archbishop Daniel Okoh, the president of the Christian Association in Nigeria. Also present were the wives of the Vice president of Nigeria, the Honourable minister of education, the wives of the state governors, ministers, senators and local government areas of the 19 northern states, Oyo state and FCT. The campaign aims at 95% national and state coverage and n0PV2, provide vaccination MR vaccines to children aged 9 months to 14 years, and reinforce the country's effort to reduce zero dose vaccination. It also aims to use this opportunity to deliver other public health interventions against malaria and other neglected tropical in selected local government areas.

The campaign is scheduled to hold in two phases: this initial phase will be undertaken in the 19 northern states including Oyo state and the Federal Capital Territory while the second phase will commence in January in the other states not included above. This campaign intends to reach 103 million children across the country.

The first lady flagged off the campaign by the symbolic Administration of oral polio virus. The launch came to a close at 12.50 P.M

There was an e-poster presentation from the RCPCH (UK) on Clinical Leadership for Clean Air: A Paediatric-led model in

LMICs and a networking event which involved stakeholders from CAF Nairobi, Urban Better, Ministry of Environment Nairobi and the University of Nairobi. The associates from Nigeria (Dr Chika Duru) and Nepal (Dr Bikal Shrestha) had an opportunity to speak on the Air Quality project in their respective countries and network with other stakeholders.

The last day of the conference included a community outreach with symbolic tree planting at St Mary's Missionary Hospital Nairobi organized by Next-Gen for Earth, a youth-led initiative aimed at empowering youths in climate action. There was also a visit to the slums in Nairobi which was organized in collaboration with Weather Mtaani, a community-based non-governmental organisation in Kibera an informal settlement in Nairobi focused on creating awareness of climate change in the community.

Communiqué Issued at the End of the Stakeholders' Consultative Meeting on HPV Vaccine Routinization Strategies and Experience-Sharing Workshop, Held on 8th December 2025, Abuja, Nigeria

A. Preambles

The International Pediatric Association (IPA) in collaboration with the Paediatrics Association of Nigeria (PAN) held a stakeholders Consultative forum and Experience Sharing Workshop on the 8th December, 2025, in West African College of Physician (WACOP) Conference Centre Abuja, Nigeria. The workshop brought together the President and Executive Director of International Paediatric Association Dr Joseph Haddad, Dr Naveen Thacker; The President of Paediatric Association of Nigeria, Dr Ekanem Ekure, Past Presidents of Paediatric Association of Nigeria, Dr Alhassan Yakubu, Dr Dorothy Esangbedo, Dr Olufemi

Ogunrinde; Her Excellency Zainab Bagudu, President Elect of the Union for International Cancer Control, President of Nigeria Society for Neonatal Medicine, Dr Iretiola Fajolu, Policymakers such as the Federal Ministry of Health, National Primary HealthCare Development Agency, National Orientation Agency, Women Advocate for Vaccine Access, Federal Ministry of Women Affairs, Pathfinder, Ministry of Budget and Planning, Executive council of Paediatric Association of Nigeria, Immunization Champions, Paediatricians, Public Health Experts, to share experiences, identify gaps, and chart a way forward for improving

childhood immunizations in Nigeria specially with respect to Human Papilloma Virus Vaccine and Measles Rubella Vaccines recently rolled out.

The meeting featured welcome address, goodwill messages, keynote presentations, Immunization champions group sessions, and technical reviews covering key thematic areas on Overview of Human Papilloma Vaccine Infection and Cervical Cancer, Navigating the advocacy terrain, maximizing opportunities to Sustainable Demand Creation.

B. Observations

3. About 8,000 women documented to die from Cervical Cancer.

4. Reasons for low demand and uptake of the Human Papilloma Virus

5. Myths and Misconception about HPV Vaccination

6. Channels for Spread of misinformation and Myths about HPV Vaccination.

7. Need for more funding

8. Attitude of healthcare workers to vaccination

9. Low vaccine coverage in internally displaced camps

C. Resolutions / Recommendations

After extensive deliberations, the workshop resolved as follows:

1. The need to strengthen policies to improve community partnership and grass root mobilization.

2. Integration of other HPV vaccination to the school health programme.

3. Strengthen policy implementation frameworks to improve accountability and sustainability.

4. Expand access to quality primary healthcare services, especially in underserved communities.

5. Promote locally driven research to address vaccine hesitancy

6. Intensify health education programs to improve parental knowledge and healthy practices.

7. Engage community leaders, faith-based organizations, and youth groups in generating demand for child health services.

8. Enhance IPA-PAN collaboration in research, capacity building, and advocacy.

D. Conclusion

Participants renewed their commitment to advancing child and adolescent health in Nigeria and globally.

The workshop reaffirmed the vital roles of IPA, PAN, government agencies, and stakeholders in ensuring a healthier future for children.

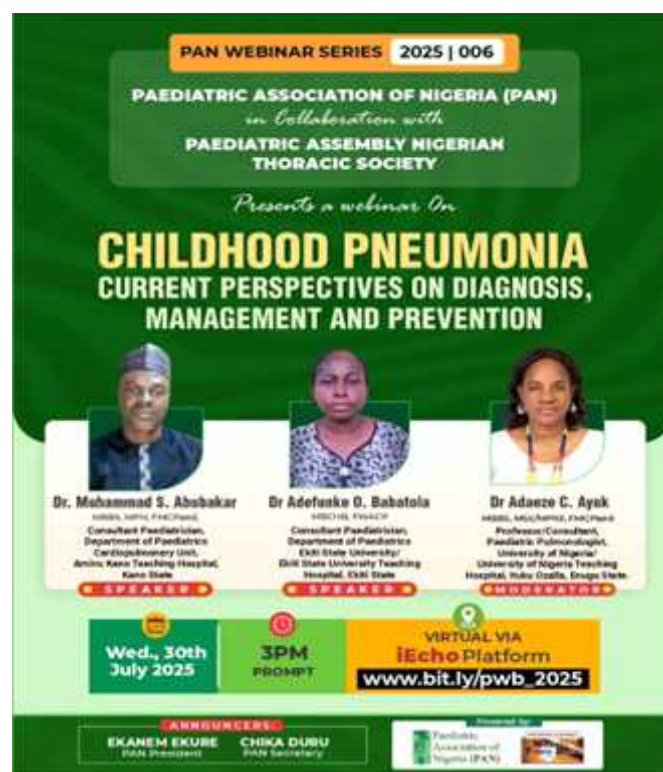
PAN Pneumonia Subcommittee

2025 Summary of Activities

In 2025, the Pneumonia Subcommittee of the Paediatric Association of Nigeria (PAN) remained actively engaged in advancing advocacy, capacity building, and awareness on childhood pneumonia prevention and control. The Subcommittee maintained a structured and consistent work plan throughout the year, anchored on regular meetings, professional education, and national advocacy events.

The Subcommittee held monthly meetings throughout the year, which provided a platform for strategic planning, review of ongoing activities, and coordination of pneumonia-related advocacy and professional engagements across the country. These meetings also facilitated collaboration among members, alignment with PAN's broader objectives, and timely decision-making on emerging child respiratory health issues.

As part of professional capacity building and knowledge dissemination, the Subcommittee actively contributed to the **PAN Webinar Series 2025/006** by organizing and delivering a **Pneumonia-focused webinar tagged "CHILDHOOD PNEUMONIA: CURRENT PERSPECTIVES ON DIAGNOSIS, MANAGEMENT AND PREVENTION"**. The webinar addressed current issues in pneumonia prevention, diagnosis, and management, and served as a continuing professional development platform for paediatricians and other child health practitioners nationwide.



In addition, the Subcommittee successfully coordinated and participated in the **2025 World Pneumonia Day celebration**, marked annually on 12 November. World Pneumonia Day (WPD) is observed annually on 12th November to raise global awareness about pneumonia—a leading killer of children under five worldwide—and to advocate for effective prevention and treatment measures. Pneumonia remains one of the highest contributors to childhood morbidity and mortality in Nigeria, driven by factors such as air pollution, low immunization coverage, malnutrition, and inadequate health system capacity.

In Nigeria, the Paediatric Association of Nigeria (PAN), through its Pneumonia Subcommittee, leads national efforts to commemorate WPD, aligning with global themes and local public health priorities. The 2025 theme in Nigeria was “Every Breath Counts: Stop Pneumonia in Its Tracks,” with an emphasis on awareness, clean air advocacy, immunization, and clinical care strategies.

2. National Coordination and Strategic Objectives

PAN's Pneumonia Subcommittee coordinated multi-stakeholder engagements involving government health agencies, professional paediatricians, NGOs, media partners, and community groups across Nigeria's **six geopolitical zones**:

- North West
- North East
- North Central
- South West
- South East
- South South

The key objectives were to:

- **Raise public awareness** about the causes, symptoms, and prevention of pneumonia.
- **Promote vaccination** including pneumococcal and Hib vaccines as part of routine immunization.
- **Strengthen early diagnosis and clinical management** at primary and secondary health facilities.
- **Advocate for clean air and environmental health** to reduce indoor and outdoor pollution risks.
- **Engage policymakers** on resource allocation for pneumonia control efforts

3. Activities Across the Six Geopolitical Zones

A. North West Zone

- **Public Health Forums & Talks** were convened in major cities like Kano and Kaduna.
- Paediatricians and public health officials delivered community education sessions on pneumonia prevention, emphasizing the importance of **exclusive breastfeeding** and **timely**

immunization. These mirrored calls from prior WPD observances to scale up effective immunization strategies.

- Local media appearances by PAN clinicians amplified key prevention messages.

B. North East Zone

- **Outreach campaigns** were conducted at healthcare centers and schools to distribute informational brochures on pneumonia symptoms and when to seek care.
- Collaborations with state health departments supported strengthened **case referral systems** for severe pneumonia cases.

C. North Central Zone

- Events in states like **Abuja and Benue** featured **clinician panels and community forums** explaining pneumonia risk factors and the role of air quality in respiratory health.
- Health talks also targeted environmental contributors to pneumonia, particularly household smoke exposure.

D. South West Zone

- Public engagements in **Lagos and Ibadan** included appearances on television and radio where PAN experts educated parents and caregivers on preventive practices and vaccination importance.
- Screenings for respiratory symptoms in children were integrated into

routine pediatric outpatient services.

E. South East Zone

- Community outreach efforts emphasized **clean indoor air strategies**, nutritional interventions to support child immunity, and the prevention of household air pollution.
- Health facility teams organized **pneumonia awareness walks** in urban centers.

F. South South Zone

- The zone, including **Port Harcourt and Calabar**, held interactive awareness sessions and **television features** to reach broader audiences. PAN's activities were also shared on broadcast platforms like AFIA TV, reaching state-level audiences with the WPD message.
- Engagement with community leaders to support *local prevention and referral pathways* was a notable focus.

4. Media Engagement and Public Awareness

PAN utilized social media posts and television appearances to amplify the WPD message nationwide. Images and reports circulated showing paediatricians **"From North to South, paediatricians are stopping pneumonia in its tracks."**

such as the **Guardian Nigeria World Pneumonia Day segments**, further broadened reach.

5. Key Messages and Advocacy Themes

Across zones, the following core messages were consistently promoted:

- **Vaccination Saves Lives:** Emphasis on pneumococcal and Hib vaccine uptake as a powerful preventive tool.
- **Early Recognition & Treatment:** Educating caregivers on recognizing symptoms such as persistent cough and difficulty in breathing, and on seeking prompt care.
- **Clean Air & Environment:** Addressing air pollution—both indoor and outdoor—as a significant risk for child pneumonia, in line with PAN's environmental health advocacy.
- **Nutrition and Child Health:** Supporting exclusive breastfeeding and balanced nutrition to enhance immune defenses.

6. Outcomes and Impact

While consolidated national statistics on attendance and reach were not independently published at the time of this report, PAN's activities across all geopolitical zones:

- **Reached diverse audiences** from urban centers to underserved rural communities.
- **Increased public knowledge** around pneumonia prevention and care.
- **Engaged policy stakeholders** on the need for sustained investment in child health infrastructure and pneumonia control programs.

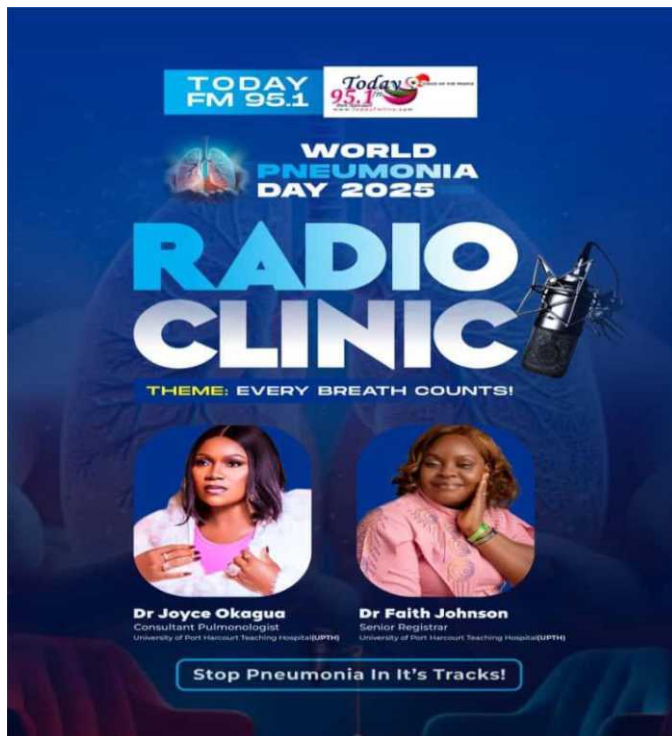
7. Conclusion

The Nigerian Association of Paediatric Gastroenterology, Hepatology and Nutrition (NAPGHAN) is a body of Healthcare Professionals with special interest in optimizing childhood nutrition and care of children with disorders of the digestive system. The goal of NAPGHAN is to advance the science of Paediatric Gastroenterology, Hepatology and Nutrition in the country through training programs, research, translation of research evidence to clinical practice and policies, advocacy, development of standard treatment guidelines, partnership with industries, and national and international collaborations for the advancement of child health in the country.

In the bid to increase the knowledge-base, skill set and capacity of members of the association for improved quality of care to children with nutritional and digestive system disorders, webinars on very important topics were presented in 2025. They included: Navigating hindgut disorders of gut brain interaction and the ending menace of Childhood Malnutrition in Nigeria and the way forward,

In the course of the year, NAPGHAN established collaboration with sister associations - The Commonwealth Association of Paediatric Gastroenterology, Hepatology and Nutrition (CAPGHAN) and the newly-formed African Society of Paediatric Gastroenterology, Hepatology and Nutrition (ASPGHAN). These collaborations have opened members of the association to new learning opportunities as well as opportunities to network with Paediatric Gastroenterologists within and beyond the continent of Africa.

The association held her 11th Annual General Meeting and Scientific Conference from the 29th July to 1st August, 2025 at Ibadan, Oyo State.

The theme of the conference was "Artificial Intelligence Revolution in Paediatrics Gastroenterology, Hepatology and Nutrition" while the sub-themes were: "Nutrition and disease: exploring the complexities and opportunities for prevention and treatment, Nutrition therapy in chronic liver diseases: Evidence based approach and Inflammatory bowel diseases - Diagnostic and management challenges in resource-limited settings.

(Inflammatory bowel diseases - Diagnostic and management challenges in resource -limited settings). Prof. Tamramat Runsewe-Abiodun delivered the lecture on Lactation Management and supervised the demonstration session. The conference ended with an Annual General Meeting and drafting of a communique.
